The United States has added two satellites, Alaska and Hawaii, and we have acquired two grandsons, so, all in all, it's been a grand year! January (29th) saw my sister, Dr. Eleanor Steindorf married to Mr. Earl Johnson. Their home is 1210 Brookmere Rd., Pasadena 2, Calif. February 13th, David Frank Percy was born to Ruth and Frank, thus putting the first spoke in the wheel at "Wagon Hollow", Northfield, Ohio. During the winter and spring, the Percy home at Wagon Hollow underwent a metamorphasis and their welcome mat is always out.

This fall, we are sadly missing our dear friends, Dr. and Mrs. R.H. Miller, who have moved to Martinsville, Indiana: - 210 W. Pike Street.

As far as this journal goes, the year is ending on a Russian note, for we have just said good-bye to the last guests of a Thanksgiving House Party we had for the people who were with us in Russia last summer. We had a great time comuring notes and viewing each other's slides and movies. We all agreed it has been a good year for progress in the promotion of World Peace.

Now that we are deep in activities common to grandparents, we seem to be reentering a children's world. We find our love and interest going out to all children everywhere, including the little Russian boy pictured here. To all of them and all of you, we bring Christmas greetings and good wishes for a happy New Year!
